## What are the Ian Fleming Musical Theatre Awards?

Our Musical Theatre awards offer support to students who wish to complete their studies at the leading UK conservatoires and performing arts colleges. The Ian Fleming Charitable Trust was founded by Ian Fleming in 1972. The Trust's initial focus was on supporting national charities in the field of support, relief and welfare, and charities involved in research on human diseases. However, a performance of *The Magic Flute* by Scottish Opera gave Ian the idea of extending the support offered by the Trust to musicians. In 1980, the Ian Fleming Charitable Trust Music Education Awards were established in partnership with Help Musicians. Outstandingly talented individual young musicians have been supported through Ian's trust every year since. To mark the twenty-first anniversary of the awards and to celebrate Ian's love of musical theatre, in 2001 Help Musicians launched the Ian Fleming Musical Theatre Awards to help musical theatre students with the costs of final year undergraduate or postgraduate study.



## Are you eligible?

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This year our awards are open to students who are either moving into their final year of undergraduate study, hoping to start or complete a postgraduate degree in September 2020.

Our Ian Fleming Musical Theatre awards are only open to students who wish to study musical theatre or musical direction at the following conservatoires or performance institutions:

- Arts Educational Schools
- Guildford School of Acting
- Guildhall School of Music and Drama
- Leeds College of Music
- London School of Musical Theatre
- Mountview Academy
- Royal Academy of Music
- Royal Birmingham Conservatoire
- Royal Central School of Speech and Drama
- Royal College of Music
- Royal Conservatoire of Scotland
- Royal Northern College of Music
- Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama
- Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance
- Urdang Academy
- Wales International Academy of Voice

To apply for our Ian Fleming Musical Theatre Awards, students must:

- Be intending to continue into their final year of their undergraduate degree or study a postgraduate degree in September 2020 (ie. Mmus, MA, PGDip, Artist Diploma)
- Have lived in the UK for at least 3 consecutive years at the start of the academic year in which they will be supported by the award
- Be in financial need
- Demonstrate that they have the musical potential and ambition to create a successful and sustainable career within the music industry

Help Musicians strongly encourages applications from students from underrepresented backgrounds, including those from BAME (Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic) backgrounds, D/deaf and disabled people; and those from lower socio-economic groups.

The maximum number of academic years for which students can receive financial support from Help Musicians towards their study is three for instrumentalists and four for singers.

## What we can't fund

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Through our Ian Fleming Musical Theatre Awards, we are unable to fund:

- Non-music performance degrees such as composition, music technology music education, music therapy, arts administration and music business
- The first and second year of undergraduate study (third if studying on a 4 year undergraduate degree)
- PhDs, MPhil, DMus, Doctorates
- Study from the previous academic year
- Applications from students not intending on studying at the above institutions





## Your application

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To apply for our musical theatre Awards, you must complete our [online application form](#). You will be asked to:

- Provide a short biography
- Outline your key achievements to date
- Tell us why you have chosen to undertake another year of study and what you hope to get out of it
- Detail your longer-term ambitions and how you hope to achieve these after graduation
- Provide financial information and a statement on what difference an award from Help Musicians will make to your studies
- Provide up to three good quality online video links to recent recordings

You should also ask a referee to [submit a reference via this online form](#) to support your application. This could be a teacher, lecturer or head of department. Choose somebody that knows you best.

The deadline to complete the application form is **5pm on Monday 25 May 2020**. Any applications submitted after this time will not be accepted.

After the deadline has passed, we will assess your application. Applications will be scored based on:

- Financial need
- Ambition to create a sustainable career

If your application is shortlisted, your video submissions will then be forwarded to our external panel for assessment. The panel will be assessing musical potential.

Extra consideration will be given to applications from students from underrepresented backgrounds, including those from BAME (Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic) backgrounds, D/deaf and disabled people; and those from lower socio-economic groups.

Extra consideration will also be given to students studying outside of London.





## Video submissions

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Due to the current situation regarding COVID 19, we have suspended all in-person activity this year. If you are shortlisted, your application will then be forwarded to our external panel who will focus on your video submissions. The panel will be looking for individuals who can demonstrate that they have the musical potential and ambition to create a sustainable career within the music industry.

### **Singers**

You must provide links to three good-quality online videos which include two musical theatre songs and 1 monologue. All three videos should last no longer than 10 minutes in total.

Bear in mind the background of your videos and make sure you entitle each video with the name of the song and its composer. We would prefer videos of solo performances with piano accompaniment or recorded backing track. We are aware that some people may not be able to record anything new during this period and therefore we may accept other recordings if discussed with the creative team prior to submission. Please make sure you have checked your online links work before you submit your application.

Please note that once you have submitted your application, you won't be able to change your recordings.

### **Musical Directors**

You must submit a CV to accompany your application and you will also have space to provide online links for up to three video recordings. One of these recordings should demonstrate your keyboard skills. Other submissions could include:

- A video of you taking a rehearsal
- A video of you directing a show
- A video of you talking through how you would go about teaching a cast a song of your choice from West Side Story
- A video of you talking through how you would approach learning an entirely new show prior to the first rehearsal.

Please email a member of the creative team to discuss your video links prior to submission.

If your application is shortlisted, we may invite you for a video interview with our panel who will ask some further questions.



## Your award

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If you are offered an award it must be used towards study costs or associated living costs for the next academic year (2020/2021). You must inform us if your study plans change and we reserve the right to alter or withdraw the award offer. **We will request evidence of place acceptance and enrolment before releasing your award.** Awards are paid directly to students. Awards of £3,000 or above will be paid in **three instalments**, in October 2020, January 2021 and April 2021. Smaller awards will be paid in one instalment in October 2020.
